



Quan Hugee, known professionally as Too Smoove, is an American rapper, singer, and songwriter from Charlotte, North Carolina. At the age of 5, Smoove discovered her talent and passion for music while singing in the children's choir. "Gospel is the first thing I remember musically, it had a huge impact. It was the first genre of music she experienced and showed me the connections between emotions and music and how important that is, says Smoove." By the time she was 7 years old, the fun and caring young star was already cultivating a strong work ethic for her craft with perfect practice and discipline.

The artist says discipline is why she is all the things that she is today — motivated, intelligent, and talented. She recalls the defining moments when she looked herself in the mirror, both asking and answering self-imposed questions about her destiny. "What do you need? What are your goals? What do you need to improve on the most? That is what she would say to herself.

In June of 2019, all of her hard work paid off and Smoove released her first EP "Anything but Ordinary." As demand for her music grew, she would release a freestyle of BIG by Young MA before following up with her second EP "Off the Porch" in October of 2020. Known for her cadence, lyrical wordplay, and delivery the LGBTQ+ artist garnered a nomination from the Queen City Music Awards for "Best New Artist," "Best Female Artist" and radio play on Power 98 FM and internet radio networks. Smoove went on to release 2 additional Freestyles WAP by Cardi B. & Meghan the Stallion and What's Next by Drake.

After losing her father to COVID in May of 2020, Smoove threw herself into music and recorded her second EP "Off the Porch" at a time when she was still grieving. In 2021, after realizing the seriousness of her mental health, she took time off to heal and grieve her father's passing. As she navigated through every stage from the initial shock and denial to the place of acceptance and hope, she knew that she was preparing her heart to return centerstage again — in front of her fans.

"I let the beat speak to me," says Smoove while describing her creative process. Her catalog of songs covers a wide array of topics but most of her released music is about romance – both good and bad.

After teaming up with artist Ari Cari, Smoove returns this spring with her latest single "Catch a Vibe."

Through her music, Too Smoove continues to set the standard and inspire listeners to not give up on their dreams. "My dream is not just to get money and be famous, it's to be a pillar of the black community. We all should have these goals that affect our society and the future generation."
